At the June board meeting, Sandra Sullivan attended as a fellowship member and asked the board if they would consider making a monthly donation to Jesse Tree. She explained that many of the regular donations, both large and small, have disappeared. Jesse Tree is struggling to meet its budget. It was a unanimous decision to donate \$100 monthly to the Jesse Tree.

Sixth Annual Empty Bowl Evening

The festivity took place at the Lasker House May 30. Three hundred tickets were sold in advance. Guests lined up before 6pm ready to find "that perfect bowl." The Lasker House is elevated, so there was shady space under the porch for all the bowls to be displayed. Additionally, there was a bar in the yard under the trees that helped keep people cool and happy until 6pm.

Don Clark of Miller's Seawall Grill assisted in the layout of the tables and serving stations, and provided menus to guide guests to the appropriate serving station for their soup. There was no waiting or lines, a big improvement over last year. Guests were seated inside, where they could hear the beautiful piano music of Valencia Arceneaux, and the singing of David Mitchell and Mara

Dacso, or out on the raised porches or on the lawn.

Soups were provided from approximately 14 local restaurants, covering a wide range of tastes from gumbo to gazpacho to butternut squash to French onion. Most guests sampled several soups and offered rave reviews of all.

Sandra Sullivan did a beautiful job obtaining and displaying desserts donated by our Fellowship members. Fanny DeGesero had a large team of bartenders who kept the drinks flowing at two bars, despite the fact that Fanny herself did not attend due to a family illness. Table decorations were handmade vases by George Bowes filled with flower arrangements donated by Jill Randall and Nancy Lee, of "Flowers for NonProfits."

Many of our Fellowship members volunteered before, during and after the event, and without their willingness to help, the event could not have occurred. Their names are not all mentioned for fear of forgetting someone, but you know who you are, and your generosity of time and effort are much appreciated.

The amount raised that evening included \$1800 raised by sale of bowls online. Then in addition to \$10,861 from ticket sales, bar donations and raffle proceeds, a generous individual made \$3,000 contribution. The grand total was \$13,861. Congratulations and thanks to all who have worked so hard to make this event a success. This donation could not have come at a better time for the Jesse Tree.

The Principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote:

Ever wondered about the ACIM –A Course in Miracles- group that meets once a week on Monday at 11am? This group studies a year long program of daily workbook lessons at the practical level and an accompanying text at the more theoretical level. The daily lesson helps me practice my faith as I read and meditate on them each morning.

What I find compelling is the Course's universal truths. It calls to a place deep inside of me that recognizes these old truths. They include nonjudgement, total acceptable of others or true brother or sisterhood-especially the ones I found most difficult. That there are only two basic emotions, love or fear, so any action I take is either out of one or the other. And I can learn to make it a conscious choice. That this path is only one of many ways and common themes are found in all religious and spiritual paths at their core.

That the goal for me is joyful, peaceful, gentle living. That sin and guilt do not

exist. That the thoughts I think are either from ego-that self serving, fearful part of myself or from a higher Self--be it the Holy Spirit, God, Jesus or love part of myself. And my thoughts are powerful in creating my world which I can experience as peaceful or chaotic. Defenseless is my best protection from getting anger triggered. That I choose can be peace or being right. And peace is much better.

I resisted the course for many years but always found myself being drawn back. There are some hard to swallow pieces like being channeled by a psychologist from Jesus so I set that to the side and look for the lessons which help me to live more peacefully. I find how it came about doesn't matter to me. It just rings true.

Recently I took the workshop on Mindfulness and heard the Tibetan Buddhist quote that we all are the mother of each other. It struck a clear note with me. For I have recognized that the one I

have loved most unconditionally is my child. And that love is the most pure and for me holiest. What wonderful goal it would be for me to love everyone I come in contact with as if he or she were my child. And that is what the Course in Miracles teaches. And the gift of love comes back to me as well. There is no difference in the giving or receiving.

Am I there yet? Of course, not. I wrestle daily with judgment. But my eyes are open to the choices I can make to create a more peaceful, loving world. Does reading the text and workbook get done in one year? Rarely. Does completing it once send you on your way? Perhaps, but for most it is a life long study. I have been studying it for 10 years and learn new truths everyday.

And how does ACIM fit with my 40 years as a UU? The seven principles resonate in perfect harmony with the course and help me walk the talk not just talk it.

“A - Team - What's That?”

For several years the UUFGC had a part-time Administrator (Rosemary Leary and briefly David Pyle), and part-time Religious Education Director (Teri Hawes), who kept up with all things administrative. Unfortunately for the Fellowship, they all gradually moved on to other pursuits, far from us, and we had to decide how to keep the Fellowship running smoothly on a limited budget.

Five members 'stepped up to the plate' and volunteered to cover the things that had to be done on a regular basis. Each person agreed to 'cover' a day and its activities so the transition would not be a huge burden on any one person. This group was the administrative team, or, as it became affectionately called [after a TV show from the 70s], "The A Team."

You may be wondering what this team does. There's not enough space here to list everything but you are invited to the office to peruse the 'activities' book they have developed. The activities include the monthly newsletter, weekly e-mail updates, opening the mail and distributing it, answering the telephone and daily e-mails, providing publicity for the Fel-

lowship, preparing the weekly order of service, keeping track of speakers and their needs, helping to identify needs and problems both in and out [the yard] of the Fellowship, reporting to the board monthly, set out garbage cans, and just generally troubleshooting.

If this sounds like something you would like to be a part of, please see any member to learn more. We would welcome you to our team. Our Fellowship "works" because we have dedicated people who are willing to pitch in when needed. Perhaps you are one. Thank you.
