FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As autumn begins we often start to think of the year as kind of, well, winding down.

At our Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, however, the year definitely is getting wound up to go. Our membership is growing to levels not seen in years, if ever. Membership chairperson **Cheryl Henry** reports that we now have 85 members in our congregation. Two new members joined in August, and four in September. Something good is happening at our Fellowship and it is bringing in fresh faces.

I like to think that it is the friendly, accepting and welcoming environment that we can point to as attracting people to us. Of course, it is more than that. Our program committee continues to impress us with stimulating speakers and presentations that draw us back for more. Also, our adult forums, book-discussion groups, supper circles, committees, pot-luck Sundays, and more offer many opportunities for members to find meaningful activities and kindred spirits.

The September 5 "Revival" program demonstrated the breadth of experience in our religious backgrounds and our spiritual journeys. Many of us took challenging paths to find our way to this Fellowship and to the Unitarian Universalist principles. Repeatedly, those who "testified" during the program expressed

their happiness over discovering a religious experience with which they can identify and embrace. I do not doubt that the UU experience has the potential to attract many more seekers to join us.

Other exciting developments are in music and children's religious education. **Susan Vaughan** (yes, my lovely wife), who also is an accomplished musician and choral director, has begun working with members interested in re-forming a choir at our Fellowship. In fact, on September 19 an unprecedented 16 people turned out to sing in the second choir practice. Susan hopes to have the singers ready to perform in a few weeks.

Laura Lee, granddaughter of longtime member **Doris Lee**, and a student at Galveston College has agreed to handle Sunday religious education. Laura grew up in our Fellowship and participated in RE in times when we had many more children. Laura is enthusiastic about reestablishing the kind of RE she remembers at our church.

So, is the year winding down? Not at our Fellowship! Happy fall.
